**Visitors to aged care:** We have been discussing the return of visitors to our aged care facilities with residents and their families to get their thoughts on how the reintroduction of visiting has been managed to date, and how we can continue to safely extend visiting durations. We are working on planning a staged and safe return of visiting. We will not be making any major changes to visiting arrangements until 22 June, when Victoria's State of Emergency is reviewed. Minor changes will occur as advice from health authorities is received and implemented. The health of our residents, staff and community members is our top priority and we will keep you updated with any changes to current visiting arrangements. A reminder, it remains essential to book visits with the facility manager/Registered Nurse in charge (For Ouyen, phone 5092 1111 and follow the prompts to the ward; for Sea Lake phone 5070 2155 and your call will be put through) and you must have had a flu vaccination to visit.

In Ouyen, Underbool, Murrayville, Manangatang and Sea Lake, our early childhood services are participating in Smiles 4 Miles. Smiles 4 Miles is an initiative of Dental Health Services Victoria and is implemented locally by MTHCS.
